

City To Begin Work On Lake Shore Drive Relocation

The actual relocation of northbound Lake Shore Drive lanes is to begin on March 15, 1996 and to be completed on December 1996. When the entire program is completed in early 1998, a new unified Museum Campus linking Chicago's three great museums with nearly 10 acres of new greenery, walkways, and bike paths along the lakefront. In addition, all lanes of

Lake Shore Drive, both northbound and southbound, will be located to the west of the Field Museum and Soldier Field.

During 1996 construction, however, drivers on southbound lanes of Lake Shore Drive south of Balbo will be temporarily detoured to the east side of the Museum and Soldier Field, sharing the roadway with northbound Lake Shore Drive. Three lanes of Lake Shore will remain open in both directions during 1996 construction.

Alternate Routes Suggested during 1996 construction:

1. Avoid Lake Shore by using: a. Drexel Blvd. b. Indiana Ave. c. Michigan Ave. d. Dan Ryan Expwy. 2. Avoid construction northbound, exit at: a. 31st Street. b. 39th Street 3. Exit (I-55) Stevenson at King Dr.



Another birth has happened in the Grand Boulevard community, right out of the heart of the Northeastern Illinois University - Center for Inner City Studies (NEIU/CICS), the founding of the United African American Student Forum UAASF), under the auspices of the World Crisis Intervention Network (WCIN).

Mr. Adeeb Asad and Mr. LaMont Evans were officially appointed by Dr. Sam Musoni, President of WCIN as Executive Coordinator and Administrative Coordinator of this new organization respectively. These young leaders were also officially appointed to the WCIN International Advisory Council.

The paramount mission of the United African American Student Forum is to organize African American college and high school students to make a significant contribution to the ongoing struggle for social, cultural, political, and economical unification, liberation, and self determination of African people everywhere

The strategy is to start initially on a citywide level, and to progressively expand their scope to state, national, and international levels. Dr. Musoni says, "We are blessed to have these young men because they bring vision, energy, diligence, and a wealth of protracted experience as student and community leaders." For example, Mr. Asad is the President Emeritus of the Black Student Movement at the Center for Inner City Studies, a member of the NEIU Student Government Association, as well as the Illinois Board of Higher Education - Student Advisory Committee Representative for NEIU. He is a third year student working on his Bachelor's of Science Degree with a major in Inner City Studies, and a minor in Mexican-Caribbean Studies at the NEIU-CICS. Mr. Evans is the President of the African American Student Organization, Student Activities Coordinator,

and the Illinois Board of Higher Education - Student Advisory Committee (Chairman for the Illinois Private Colleges and Universities) for the DeVry Institute of Technology-Chicago Campus.

This organization is unique because it is the only one of its kind in the State of Illinois that has such a wide platform that seeks to unify and facilitate solidarity among African American college and high school students. The UAASF plans to train African American students to lead and organize on their campuses and within their communities. The UAASF gears its energies towards providing a forum to voice issues, concerns, and aspirations of students, and to sound the trumpet of social and political consciousness that will capture and stir the conscience of the world.

City Ups The Ante Against Deadbeat Parents

In effort to mae children "our top priority," Mayor Richard M. Daley announced a new ordinance that would delay license approvals and deny City loans to business owners who are delinquent on their child support payments.

In a four-pronged approach targeting business licenses, city contractors and loan applicants, and city employees, the ordinances would also subject city employees who are delinquent in child support payments and do not take steps to fulfill those obligations to progressive disciplinary actions. Contractors bidding on city contracts would be subject to an 8 percent increase on their bids if they were behind on child support.

Peeples was among several child support advocates and business leaders who joined Mayor Daley, City Clerk Jim Laski, Arenda Troutman. About 70,000 businesses are licensed by the City. In order to access to relevant information about child support payments, the new ordinances will require all businesses with licenses or applying for licenses to provide addresses and other information.

Several states have enacted statutes to facilitate collecting unpaid child support -- including Maine, Massachusetts, California, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, New York, Virginia and Delaware. Chicago is the first city to target business licensees.

While employees' paychecks are subject to automatic withholding, and professionals can lose their licenses if they fall behind, business owners fall through a gap in the state child support enforcement mechanism," Mayor Daley said. "These ordinances will enable Consumer Services to investigate any applicant or licensee to determine if they are paying child support, and to inform state enforcement agencies when an individual is behind."

An Open Letter To The Republican Presidential Candidates

Dear Editor

Yesterday, in South Carolina the Republican presidential candidates held one of their 1996 primary debates. In that debate, the candidates were asked about flying the confederate flag over the Georgia Capitol. Patrick Buchanan responded by saying that the flag did not fly over slavery, but was a symbol of honor and courage in battle. He then said that if the civil rights community can sing "We Shall Overcome" then there is nothing wrong with singing "Dixie."

That position may be expected from Pat Buchanan, in South Carolina, as he is making crude racial and religious appeals a centerpiece of his presidential campaign. That is why he has the support of Lester Maddox and David Duke. However, all of the other candidates on the stage with him remained silent or gave tacit approval. When the others say that this is a matter for these states to decide, they are giving tacit approval to Mr. Buchanan's statements.

Let us be clear, "Dixie" is not the moral equivalent of "We Shall Overcome," One symbolizes legal apartheid, the other symbolizes overcoming legal apartheid. The confederate flag and "Dixie" divided us along lines of race. "We Shall Overcome" united a majority of Americans across racial, religious and economic lines. The confederate flag and "Dixie" are seen around the world as symbols of a shameful past. "We Shall Overcome" is sung everywhere around the world in freedom, equal rights and democracy struggles about a hopeful future.

"Dixie" and the confederate flag are symbolic of a racist and anti-Semitic South. The confederate flag is loaded with official racism, anti-Semitism, sexism, anti-worker and anti-voting rights symbolism. The decision by the other presidential candidates to remain silent is to allow false southern pride to continue to exist because of false southern political fears. If there is a "New South" - as all the presidential candidates say, and, as I believe there is -- then it must be appealed to politically by candidates of conviction and courage. representatives of the New South cannot remain silent in the face of a brazen attempt to resurrect the "Old South!"

For the other candidates to respond to Pat Buchanan's over racial, political appeals by saying that these are matters of state's rights," if to pull the cover off the real Republican agenda with regard to returning block

grants to the states, and with regard to the weakening or the elimination of federal standards. States' rights is a throwback to state's wrongs. After all, the "Old South" had much to do with making such federal standards necessary in the first place.

There is a new South. The "New South" allowed Jimmy Carter and Bill Clinton to rise and lead all of the American people-something the "Old South" could never have done. The "New South" allowed economic investment and growth. The "New South" allowed economic investment and growth. The "New South" brought with it the 1996 Olympic Games, and the Atlanta Braves, Hawks and Falcons; the New Orleans Saints; and the Charlotte Hornets and Carolina Panthers. They would never have come to the old Buchanan South.

The "New South" has helped the South, the nation and the nation's image in the world. Buchanan's confederate flag and Dixie would help to unravel those gains.

Pat Buchanan likes to talk about his boyhood. That is all well and good. But I had a boyhood too. That boyhood was in Greenville. South Carolina, where my father went off to fight the Germans and Nazism in the name of democracy, but when he returned home he did not have the right to vote. One Christmas, when I was home from college, I wanted to use the Greenville public library but was denied because of my race. My daddy was called "boy" and my mother was called "girl." We had to drink out of a "colored" water fountain, be served out of the back of the cafe by the road, and sit in the back of the bus while paying the same fare to ride. In whose name was this done? The symbol of all this? The confederate flag and "Dixie!"

We need conviction and leadership from those in the Republican party who would be president of all Americans, to match the conviction and leadership that Pat Buchanan is giving through his appeal to the old confederacy. Neither Pat Buchanan, nor his racist appeal should be taken lightly.

We do not need the election of 1996 to be a repeat of a Supreme Court decision in 1896, where a conservative and racist Court turned back the clock on racial progress. Such a repetition is not inevitable, but the challenge must be met head on with strong moral leadership.

This letter is a moral appeal to all the Republican presidential candidates to step up to the place of racial, gender and worker grievances, and hit a home for racial, gender and worker justice, freedom and civility everywhere



Redmond Warns Of Abusive Prosecutors

Commenting on the recent spate of initiatives designed to undercut the rights of citizens in criminal proceedings, Larry Redmond, the Harold Washington Party candidate for Cook County State's Attorney, warned that the people of this county must beware who they pick as prosecutor.

Referring to two bills recently introduced in Springfield by ex-Will County prosecutor Edward Petka, Redmond said, "The first is designed to undercut the availability and the effectiveness of relief granted by the post-conviction statute. The second is designed to remove the ability to introduce evidence of innocence after a criminal conviction. As a state representative, Petka is doing nothing more than perpetuating his invidious scheme of herding young minority men into the state's prison system."

Redmond pointed out that Cook County States Attorney Jack O'Malley contributed to this scheme in his recently-announced initiative to replace judges who have been elected

by the people with political hacks appointed by the Executive branch under the guise of merit selection.

Taken together, these initiatives serve to undercut the rights of all citizens. "Hungry for safer streets and neighborhoods, the American people have fallen victim to political rhetoric promising law and order," Redmond said. "We have been led to believe that criminals have all the rights, and we close our eyes when we see those rights being chipped

Redmond went on to say that criminals have only those rights that all citizens have. "In an attempt to cut back those rights to snare criminals, we are really only snaring ourselves. These measures make it easy for unscrupulous prosecutors to convict any individual accused of a crime and then hamstring that individual's efforts to prove his innocence." Redmond warned, "this trend must be fought, because state's attorneys have a duty to pursue the truth, not merely to amass

Redmond noted that neither Jack O'Malley nor Richard Devine, the Democratic Party candidate for Cook County State's Attorney, have the strength of conviction to resist this erosion of individual rights. "One need only look at O'Malley's record in office to see his complete lack of regard for the rights of the citizens of Cook County," Redmond said, referring to O'Malley's handling of the Gould, Guillen and Hill cases.

"As for Dick Devine," Redmond continued, "consider his involvement as First Assistant State's Attorney under Richard Daley in the John Burge case and, more recently, his involvement as lead' counsel in the Ward Remap case. He's a coldblooded hired gun with no regard for the rightness or wrongness of the cases he takes. He is not the kind of man the people of Cook County want exercising discretion in criminal







Life is full of "new beginnings." As moments unfold into minutes, hours, into days, months, years.

Those of us who are fortunate enough to recount experiences and memories can turn back the wheels of time sharing things that remind us to

realize: "Life begins over, and over, and over, and -- until life ends?" So, we must remind ourselves of this, repeatedly, and continuously record our history and black heroes for our future generations to reaffirm our place in the universe.

One breath of history in my life that I remember concerning our hero, A. (Asa) Phillip Randolph, powerful Founder and President of The Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, one -- if not the first has served memberships in this country! Black or white. I did not know Mr. Randolph very long; about three months. Because my first job after graduating

from Wendell Phillips High School, Chicago's south side, was with the Brotherhood, the blunders as well as rewards; my precociousness, maturing into adulthood remain with me, I am proud to say. Unfortunately, some of us never mature, regardless of age. They simply "live on."

A. Phillip Randolph was very impressive looking. Not because of his good looks, but because the man simply radiated with dignity and class in a very subdued way, very gentlemanly, yet strong. The Chairman of the Brotherhood was quite the opposite of Mr. Randolph. He was Milton P. Webster. The best thing that I can say about that man (and probably the only thing that really matters) is that if I had been a Pullman Porter and happened to be black, in trouble with the threat of being fired for whatever reason, I would have loved having Mr. Webster defend me. This man was dynamite defending his Brotherhood membership, whether they were right or wrong. He had a forceful way about him vengeance. Some of his effectiveness remains with me,

also. I will never forget the word, "exemporaneous;" he branded it on my mind, although, I feel, embarrassing me, unfairly. In his loud, condescending voice while dictating a brief to me (as if I was not having enough trouble with my shorthand, in answer to my query): "Do you mean to tell me you never heard the word e-x-t-e-m-p-o-r-a-n-e-o-u-s and you don't know what it means? And, you graduated from high school?"

Yes, he was quite the opposite of Mr. Randolph. I recall his disrespect that caused me to quit my job on the spot.

Talking about a swollenheaded! I had finished my work and requested two hours of leave to attend a friend's funeral that afternoon. Mr. Webster buzzed for me to come into his office and he said to me: "Little girl, you know you can't go to al the funerals." I had never asked before and he did not ask me whose funeral I wanted to attend. Mr. Randolph and other New York office officials were sitting in Mr. Webster's office and heard what took place. I accepted his denial to my request and went back to my office, tearfully disappointed. I thought about it for a minute and packed my things, returning to Mr.

Webster's office without knocking. I told him that he was the most ignorant man I had ever known, not to mail me my check I would pick it up, walked out of the office and he was saying to me: "You better think about it. You know you have to work 'cause there's nobody but you and your mother." Without looking back I replied: "Yeah, I have to work. But after working here I know I can work any place." I made sure I slammed his door with a "bang!"

When I picked up my check on Saturday from the Executive Secretary, she told me that after I left Mr. Randolph gave Mr. Webster hell! Told him he had been very mean and unfair to me and reprimanded him severely.

Life begins at -- 40? I don't think so. I am still experiencing new beginnings. What about you? We want to know about some of your new beginnings. Write to South Street Journal and tell us. Also, most importantly; we need to: Develop our own labor unions and visit The Memorial to A. Phillip Randolph on Chicago's south side. Research The Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, soon.
