On May 20, 1970 the above named individual was resentenced in your Court from Death to a Life sentence.

On April 17, 1972 a white officer was killed by three black militants from the New Orleans area. Brown testified for the State and on the basis of his testimony these three individuals received a life sentence each.

Mr. Brown is 67 years old, is in poor health, and will by necessity leave the state if his sentence is commuted to time served. In any event, he is a protection case at the penitentiary, his life is in danger, and the only way we can protect him is to restrict his freedom which doesn't encourage other people to help the State when heinous crimes are committed.

Mr. Brown's case is scheduled to be heard by the next Pardon
Board and I would appreciate any consideration that you would
give him. It is my opinion that at his age and his general
physical condition, he is not going to be in conflict with the

law and his release, I believe, is well deserved. He has now served a total of Seven Years and Seven Months although officially his sentence did not begin until 1970.

It is my understanding that the above referenced case was considered by the Pardon Board during its last session and that favorable consideration has tentatively been given depending upon a favorable recommendation from you.

You will recall that Mr. Brown was a key witness in the apprehension and conviction of the three inmates who killed Brent Miller, a correctional officer at the Louisiana State Penitentiary, two years ago.

Although Mr. Brown's record indicates that he was only sentenced January 7, 1971, he has been incarcerated almost eight years at this time.

Mr. Brown has an excellent conduct record, he has never had a disciplinary report since his incarceration, he is now 67 years old and in poor health and plans to leave the State if he is granted relief. Because of his testimony and the fact that he was a State witness he does not feel that he can safely return to New Orleans.

In April, 1972 Hezekiah Brown witnessed the murder of a correctional officer at Angola. As a result of his willingness to come forward, other witnesses were found and convictions of three inmates were obtained.

Since that time, Mr. Brown has been a protection case and it has been necessary to keep him at the dog pen.

It is my personal opinion that the State has an obligation to try to help this individual in some way. I realize the seriousness of Mr. Brown's crime; however, at his age atthink it is extremely doubtful that he will be involved in this type of offense in the future. He has a heart condition which makes it impossible for him to walk any distance without becoming extremely short of breath. However, because of his testimony, he is afraid to go to the Angola Hospital or for that matter any of the charity hospitals where inmates are kept. The specific type of relief we are requesting is that his sentence be commuted to parole eligibility then we will attempt to work out plans for him in Michigan where he has relatives. He knows that he cannot return to New Orleans since the three individuals he testified against

are from there.

Any consideration given him will be greatly appreciated. When he appeared before you helped him but the Lieutenant Governor and the Attorney General, as I remember, did not go along.
